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**Many Petals, One Flower:
International Buddhist Friends Association (IBFA)**

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In 1978 I arrived in Edmonton as a practitioner of integrated traditional Chinese medicine and Western family and geriatric medicine. Two years later I founded the IBFA, having perceived the need for an organization to promote Buddhism in Edmonton and Alberta. More specifically, I sought to establish an 'umbrella' group that would serve to bring the various Buddhist community groups together for mutual learning, sharing and spiritual cultivation. This, I hoped with all my heart, would help further the teachings of the Buddhist Dharma for the benefit of the multi-cultural Canadian community and, indeed, all sentient beings everywhere. As a physician I have always been exposed to the normal consequences of human nature, notably, suffering, sickness and old age and death, and I hoped the IBFA would provide service in this vital area, not only in Canada but also internationally.

The bringing together of the different groups under the aegis of the IBFA was a challenging task to be undertaken in a spirit of loving kindness. I have always tried to incorporate the Buddhist concern for loving kindness into my integrated medical practice as well as my initiatives involving the various Buddhist communities. In keeping with my Burmese Buddhist heritage, I conceptualize 'loving kindness' in terms of *metta*. *Metta* is a broad - but pivotal - term encompassing *karuna* (unconditional selflessness), *saydana* (compassion) and *mudita* (sympathetic joy).¹

My initial step in creating the IBFA was to meet with the members of the Dharmadatu Meditation Centre, directed by Thelma and Harry Hagood (it was one of the few active local Buddhist groups at that time). This was a productive meeting. I subsequently met with Rev Ikuta, Rev Miyakawa, Dr Kawamura, Dr Hironaka and other representatives of the Japanese Buddhist community of southern Alberta, the most active Buddhists in the province at that time. I also met with other notable individuals such as Lama Geshe Kaldan, who supported the idea of creating an umbrella group to bring Alberta Buddhists together to promote the Buddhist Dharma. Secondly, I donated some of my time and energy to help the Vietnamese Buddhist Congregation construct a temple in Edmonton. Third, I convened a planning conference of individuals and groups interested in Buddhism. It was held in Edmonton at the University of Alberta in May 1980. There were over 40 participants. I was pleased to find so much interest from Buddhists of various cultural traditions, including Canadian, Cambodian, Chinese, Japanese, Sri Lankan, Thai, Tibetan and Vietnamese. Conference participants wholeheartedly supported the idea of creating the IBFA.

The IBFA was formally established in the summer of 1980. I designed the IBFA emblem to represent - despite their interesting and enlightening differences - the essential unity of the various Buddhist traditions as represented by each group. Circling above the numinous lotus flower is the Buddhist rosary. Each bead of the rosary symbolizes a

distinct Buddhist community group. The beads are in contact with one another, but each has its own individuality and is free to exist, transform and evolve in its own right. It is my hope and conviction that the groups will continue to assist one another, the bigger groups helping the smaller, the stronger groups helping the weaker and the older groups helping the newer.

The IBFA's first annual Wesak Celebration of the birth, death and enlightenment of Siddhartha Gautama was held in May 1982 at one of the major high schools in Edmonton, the capital city of the province of Alberta, Canada. It was a harmonious, fruitful and enlightening occasion, with over 300 participants from various Buddhist community groups and the Alberta interfaith religious community. This formally established the Wesak Celebration as an annual event, which the IBFA organizes in co-operation with its member groups (it is held every year at the temple of a different affiliated organization). The IBFA's annual Wesak Celebration features Dharma talks from invited distinguished speakers, a bathing of the Buddha ceremony, flower presentations, special music and dance performances, metta chantings/blessings, a children's program, candlelight closing ceremony and vegetarian dinner. It is worth noting that the candles used in the inaugural candlelight ceremony 15 years ago are still used today for this same traditional, spiritual purpose.



The IBFA, in addition to its annual Wesak Celebration, sponsors and organizes visits by eminent Buddhist monks such as the Venerable Amchok Rinpoche and the Venerable Sayadaw U Thila Wunta (Mon). The Venerable Amchok visits Edmonton from time to time to present Dharma talk, retreats and other Buddhist ceremonials for IBFA members as well as the general public. He conducted the official opening ceremony of the Third World Congress of Medical Acupuncture and Natural Medicine held in Edmonton in August 1995.² This ceremonial featured the presence of eight medicine Buddha statues which, during a private meeting in Dharmasala, India, in January 1991, His Holiness the Dalai Lama suggested that I bring to Edmonton to bless and enhance the health, well being and quality of life of Albertans, Canadians – and all sentient beings.

The Venerable Sayadaw visited the IBFA in Edmonton, August 1987, when he constructed his 23rd international peace pagoda. He has erected many such pagodas in Myanmar and in several other countries around the world. It is the Venerable Sayadaw's way of facilitating the cultivation of world peace and harmony. The IBFA is currently helping him arrange to build a pagoda in South Africa.

The IBFA has also sponsored several sacred music/dance performances of the Rinpoche of Drepung Loseling Monastery, India. Moreover, as president of the IBFA, I was invited to represent the IBFA at the Buddhism into the Year 2000 Conference in

Bangkok in February 1991. Most recently, the IBFA has become involved in the lengthy and rigorous application process to join the World Fellowship of Buddhists.

In conclusion, I would like to say that as it approaches the 20th anniversary of its founding and the advent of 21st century, the IBFA is prepared to continue its humble role in expanding the Buddhist Dharma, providing social services and charitable works and enhancing understanding of Buddhism among Albertans and Canadians.³ We have achieved some success, but more work needs to be done to enhance Buddhist unity and help spread the precious, compassionate and enlightening light of the Triple Gem – the Buddha, the Dharma and the Sangha. We of the IBFA embrace the concept of “many petals, one flower” and we fervently hope that all sentient beings everywhere come to realize and dwell in the wellness of their own being.

I would like to extend my heartfelt gratitude to all those who have taken the time and effort to support the IBFA and participate in its activities and events over the years. We treasure the spirit of kind co-operation and harmony among all Buddhist groups – there are now over 20 affiliated organizations in the IBFA – and we value the unique contribution of each individual and group to furthering the Buddhist Dharma. In unity there is strength, and our goal is to help create a strong and harmonious Canadian and international community unified in the quest for genuine compassion.

To promote the Buddha Dharma teachings and to facilitate, enhance and empower cooperation and compassion amongst all Buddhist and other religious community groups around the world.

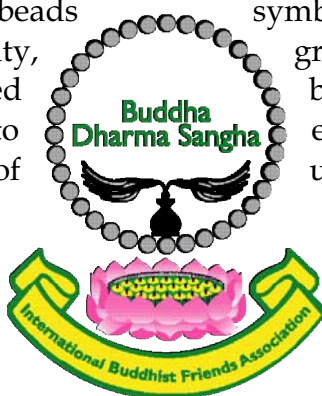
EXPLANATION OF THE IBFA LOGO:

The banner at the base of the logo gently but confidently enfolds the Lotus flower.

The Lotus is regarded throughout the East as a symbol of purity, gentleness, harmony and enlightenment. Usually depicted as closed, the open Lotus shown in this logo represents openness to truth and tolerance toward all religious traditions.

Circling above the Lotus flower is the Buddhist rosary, which is used in meditation. Each bead of the rosary represents a distinct Buddhist community group. Each bead is in contact with another but has its own individuality and is free to turn on its own. The gray shade of these beads symbolizes the first essential step toward complete solidity, groundedness and inner strength. The large, black, pagoda-shaped bead in the center of the logo is a constant reminder of the need to empty oneself to make room for one's growing awareness of ultimate reality.

pagoda-shaped bead suggest enlightenment are moving in health, happiness and harmony

The three knots of eternity binding the tassels and the rosary together indicate total, disciplined commitment to Buddhism. The tassels are gently holding up the Triple Gem, namely, the Buddha, the Dharma and the Sangha.
